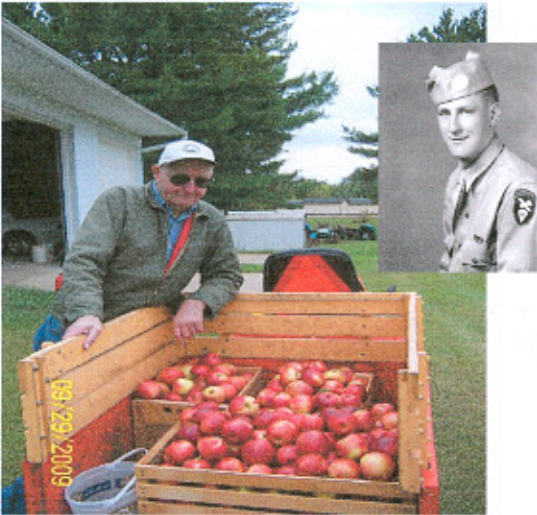

**Resolution makes it official:**

**August 16 is National Airborne Day**

**CONGRESSIONAL RECORD—SENATE**

**S8700 August 3, 2009 States.**

**NATIONAL AIRBORNE DAY**

*Mr. Dodd:* Mr. President, I ask unanimous consent that the Senate now proceed to the consideration of S. Res. 235, which was submitted earlier today. ....

*The presiding officer:* Without objection, it is so ordered.

The resolution (S. Res. 235) was agreed to. The preamble was agreed to. The resolution, with its preamble, reads as follows:

S. RES. 235

Whereas the airborne forces of the Armed Forces have a long and honorable history as units of adventuresome, hardy, and fierce warriors who, for the national security of the United States and the defense of freedom and peace, project the effective ground combat power of the United States by Air Force air transport to the far reaches of the battle area and, indeed, to the far corners of the world; Whereas August 16 marks the anniversary of the first official Army parachute jump on **August 16, 1940**, an event that validated the innovative concept of inserting United States ground combat forces behind a battle line by means of a parachute;

Whereas the United States experiment with airborne infantry attack began on June 25, 1940, when the Army Parachute Test Platoon was first authorized by the Department of War, and was launched when 48 volunteers began training in July 1940; ....

Whereas, since the airborne community celebrates August 16 as the anniversary of the first official jump by the Army Parachute Test Platoon, August 16 would be an appropriate day to recognize as National Airborne Day:

Now, therefore, be it *Resolved*, That the Senate—

(1) **designates August 16, 2009, as "National Airborne Day";** and

(2) **calls on the people of the United States to observe National Airborne Day with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities.**

## **Local man trying to preserve World**

### **War II history**

PANAMA CITY — It is the inevitable conclusion of a generation, even the "Greatest" one, that the generation must end. But Scott Ramsey is working to ensure the voices of that generation, and its veterans



in particular, are recorded for the future.

Ramsey, a local courier, is using his own time and equipment to travel to reunions and conventions to meet and speak with the veterans of World War II. Inspired by his travels to the World War II memorial, Ramsey has set out to memorialize the stories of the United States' rapidly dwindling number of World War II veterans.

During the course of his now 4-year-old mission, Ramsey has interviewed U.S. veterans, Britons and Canadians, and even has crossed now-forgotten political boundaries to speak with Germany's remaining veterans.

"No matter where they were and what they did," Ramsey said. "All of them."

The final shots of World War II fell silent more than 60 years ago, and time has transformed the World War II generation into what was dubbed by journalist Tom Brokaw as the "Greatest Generation." But Ramsey said the remaining veterans, despite some concerns about the history being lost, see themselves as ordinary Americans.

"A lot of them feel like they didn't do anything. They're very humble about what they did," he said.

But Ramsey said his work has instilled a passion for the history of the war, especially as told by the men and women who witnessed it.

"These guys were 19, 20, 21 years old. At 23, I was on Panama City Beach trying to pick up girls," he said. "You just can't help but be awed by what they did."

Each veteran's narrative has its own story line, but they often intersect in similar areas. Everyone he speaks with remembers where they were when the news broke about Pearl Harbor, he said, and everyone has a list of friendships forged long ago in a much different world that continue to this day. Ramsey said he often brings maps and other artifacts to interviews, and many people still can trace the paths they followed.

Even after 60 years, the stories are not complete, and Ramsey insists sitting down to listen and record often results in nuances, details and fresh stories that surprise even the veterans' families. For others, he said, even six decades of buffer have not dampened the raw emotions the war evokes.

"You can always tell it from a different perspective. ... There are always things you miss," he said.

Some of Ramsey's works have made it as high as the Library of Congress. Others have stayed in Bay County, but he said the final resting place of his records are a far distant second to ensuring the records exist at all.

"I think it needs to be passed down," he said.

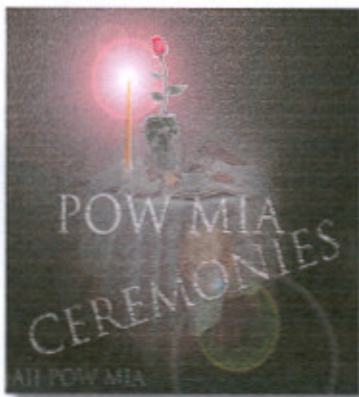

This table is our way of symbolizing the fact that members of our profession of arms are missing from our midst. They are commonly called POWs or MIAs, we call them "Brothers." They are unable to be with us this evening and so we remember them.

This Table set for one is small -- Symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner alone against his oppressors. Remember!

The Tablecloth is white -- Symbolizing the purity of their intentions to respond to their country's call to arms. Remember!

The single Red Rose displayed in a vase reminds us of the families and loved ones of our comrades-in-arms who keep the faith awaiting their return. Remember!

The Red Ribbon tied so prominently on the vase is reminiscent of the red ribbon worn upon the lapel and





breasts of thousands who bear witness to their unyielding determination to demand a proper accounting of our missing. Remember!  
The Candle, the candle is lit -- Symbolizing the upward reach of their unconquerable spirit. Remember!

A Slice of Lemon is on the bread plate to remind us of their bitter fate. Remember!

There is Salt upon the bread plate -- Symbolic of the families tears as they wait. Remember!

The Glass is inverted -- They cannot toast with us this night. Remember!

The Chair -- The chair is empty. They are not here. Remember!

Remember! -- All of you who served with them and called them comrades, who depended upon their might and aid, and relied upon them, for surely, they have not forsaken you. Remember!

Remember! -- Until the day they come home, Remember!

Richard, (my husband), never really talked a lot about his time in Viet Nam other than he had been shot by a sniper. However, he had a rather grainy, 8 x 10 black and white photo he had taken at a USO show of Ann Margaret with Bob Hope in the background that was one of his treasures.

A few years ago, Ann Margaret was doing a book signing at a local bookstore. Richard wanted to see if he could get her to sign the treasured photo so he arrived at the bookstore at 12 o'clock for the 7:30 signing.

When I got there after work, the line went all the way a round the bookstore, circled the parking lot and disappeared behind a parking garage. Before her appearance, bookstore employees announced that she would sign only her book and no memorabilia



would be permitted.

**Ann Margaret - 1966**

Richard was disappointed, but wanted to show her the photo and let her know how much those shows meant to lonely GI's so far from home.. Ann Margaret came out looking as beautiful as ever and, as second in line, it was soon Richard's turn.

He presented the book for her signature and then took out the photo. When he did, there were many shouts from the employees that she would not sign it. Richard said, "I understand. I just wanted her to see it."

She took one look at the photo, tears welled up in her eyes and she said, "This is one of my gentlemen from



Viet Nam and I most certainly will sign his photo. I know what these men did for their country and I always have time for 'my gentlemen.'"

With that, she pulled Richard

across the table and planted a big kiss on him. She then made quite a to-do about the bravery of the young men she met over the years, how much she admired them, and how much she appreciated them. There weren't too many dry eyes among those close enough to hear. She then posed for pictures and acted as if he were the only one there.

Later at dinner, Richard was very quiet. When I asked if he'd like to talk about it, my big strong husband broke down in tears. "That's the first time anyone ever thanked me for my time in the Army," he said.

That night was a turning point for him. He walked a little straighter and, for the first time in years, was proud to have been a Vet. I'll never forget Ann Margaret for her graciousness and how much that small act of kindness meant to my husband. I now make it a point to say "Thank you" to every person I come across who served in our Armed Forces. Freedom does not come cheap and I am grateful for all those who have served their country.

The vets on the panel were living proof that the 502 was there as well, and their history adds a lot of amazing stories that most people have still never heard. I still mourn the total lack of attention that the



501st Geronimo Regt has *never* received. After each presentation, the panel received a standing ovation and every soldier present came forward to meet and shake hands with the WWII guys. It was an amazing experience and I wish all who frequent here could have seen it. After the last presentation on Saturday, the vets were all made DMORs, Distinguished Member of the Regiment, presented with pins and framed certificates and this was an unexpected honor for them.

**September 2009 - 65<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the liberation of southern Netherlands**

Bruce Cole, San Antonio, TX and his half-sister, Cynthia (Cindy) Suich, Columbia, MO, Betty Taylor Hill, Sugar Land, TX, Elaine Smith, Floral City, FL, Ed Hallo, (501) Wixim, MI and his daughter, Sharon Dinley, were among the many American who traveled to Eindhoven, Eerde, Best, Son, Nimegan, Arnhem,



and other parts of the country to join in the celebration. This was the first time for Bruce to be there and was an emotional time for he and Cindy in the unveiling of a monument honoring his father, LTC. Robert G. Cole, 3 Bn 502 Commander near the place where he was killed by an enemy sniper on September 18, 1944. On three occasions while there Bruce visited his father's grave at the American National Cemetery at Margarten.



Speakers and guests at the unveiling included, LTC. (Ret) Harry Smits, Director, of the museum at Best (Wings of Liberation Museum) and originator of the monument, Mr. Yvo Kortmann, mayor of the city of Best, Col Jenkins, commander of the 506th regiment of

the 101st Airborne brigade, Mr. Michael Gallagher, Deputy Chief of Mission of the Embassy of the United States of America. VIP's were the commander of the 13th Brigade in Oirschot, Brigadier-general Ton Middendorp and the commander of Airbase Eindhoven Colonel Bas Pellemans. Also in attendance were founder of the museum mr. Jan Driessen and his wife Colette, and members of the family of Joe Mann, H-502, KIA, September 19, 1944, Medal of Honor recipient.



During the impressive unveiling ceremony, Betty Taylor Hill placed a wreath from Co. I, 502 PIR at the monument. The wreath ribbon read: "The eagle will always scream for our fallen brothers", and "Co. I, 502 PIR"
